There seems to be some confusion about skylight cleaning and maintenance. As stated in last month's newsletter, inspection and any required repairs or caulking should be done every 2 to 3 years.

Cleaning can be done by anyone who is authorized by the HOA to be up on our roofs and does not require a written request.

Repairs and caulking can only be performed by a HOA approved contractor and requires a written request sent to our management company, Thornburg & Associates.

The recent flooding rain has had many Huntington Woods residents wondering about purchasing flood insurance. Any homeowner wanting to learn the details about flood insurance should promptly contact their insurance agent, because after purchase, it takes thirty (30) days for the insurance to become effective.

FYI: A Natural Insecticide

We have discovered an environmentally safe insecticide. It is Diatomaceous Earth, a naturally occurring, soft, siliceous sedimentary rock that is crumbled into a fine white powder. It is one of the safest dusts to use in the home rather than chemical insecticides. Squeezing a puff into wall crevices, spreading around base of plants, or sprinkling on soil wherever insects are found are among the ways it can be used.

Ants have been a problem for us since moving into our home and I have been concerned about having to use the chemical insecticides around our little dog.

It has been a big relief to get control of our ant problem with Diatomaceous Earth. We made our purchase from Lowe's, but most any hardware or gardening store probably carries it.
